Volunteers take stock of river

The Uncompandere Watershed Partnership facilitated its first comprehensive bioassessment of the Uncompandere River last weekend.

Volunteers from all over the watershed, and beyond, met in Montrose Friday, Oct. 8 to learn how to collect bugs, look at rocks, measure stream velocity and much more before dividing into teams to conquer the river assessment on Saturday.

According to Sarah Sauter, UWP coordinator, "It's a quick and dirty look at the river." Although quick, twenty volunteers dedicated a full eight-hour day to visiting sites along the river in their respective section. "Keeping the river as wild and clean as possible is very important to me," noted one volunteer in her evaluation of the event.

The UWP will now analyze the data and complete a "report card" of the
