Last week both Ridgway Mayor John Clark and Ouray Mayor Bob Risch recognized Emily Galanto, through the Corporation for National and Community Service, for her service to the town and city through the Uncompangre Watershed Partnership. Galanto is part of a larger group called the Western Hardrock Watershed Team, funded by the Americorps VISTA program, Office of Surface Mining, Colorado Division of Mining, Reclamation and Safety, the Southwest Conservation Corps and many others.
