Our Watershed Facts

Name: Uncompangre River Watershed

Location: Gunnison Basin, southwestern Colorado

Headwaters: Lake Como at 12,215 feet in the Uncompanyare National Forest and other tributaries that originate as high as 14,158 feet at the peak of Mt. Sneffels and down to 4,915 feet in Delta



Area: 1,115 square miles over seven counties

Length: approximately 75 miles, flowing northwest past Ouray, Ridgway, Montrose and Olathe, joining the Gunnison River in Delta

Topography: highly varied, ranging from the snow-capped San Juan Mountains to the south, through the Uncompandere River Valley with the Uncompandere Plateau to the west and the barren desert lands of the Gunnison uplift and Adobe badlands on the east



Last Saturday of June

The annual Ridgway RiverFest is organized by UWP to celebrate our watershed, and bring together our community and visitors for a full day of fun for all ages at the Uncompahgre River in Rollans Park, Ridgway, Colorado. With no entry fee, everyone can enjoy this popular outdoor festival with a wide range of activities from river races and the Junk of the Unc homemade boat competition to live music, Ute cultural presentations, youth entertainment, watershed education, and food and drink.










The Uncompangre Watershed



The name of the Uncompahgre River comes from the Ute word that means red water, muddy water or a water that is slow moving. The Utes lived along the river since early times because of the water, plants, and wildlife. Flowing from the headwaters in the San Juan Mountains, the river is the artery of a large watershed and one reason many people choose to live here in Ouray County. Whether enjoying recreation on and around the river and the Ridgway Reservoir or using the valuable natural resource for irrigating agricultural fields, we rely on the watershed to support our lifestyles.

works to inform and engage

all stakeholders and solicits input from diverse interests to ensure collaborative restoration efforts in the watershed.

UWP was created in the spring of 2007, when regional groups and concerned citizens applied for a watershed-planning grant. Incorporated as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit in 2013, our goals and objectives are to improve water quality, riverine ecosystem function, seasonal low flows, and recreation opportunities, as well as to create a stable stakeholder group. Our Projects

UWP has many ongoing projects and annual activities aimed at protecting and restoring the watershed. We engage in community outreach and education throughout the year, including the Ridgway RiverFest, field trips into the San Juans, and watershed education in local schools.

Abandoned Mine Site Remediation

UWP brings together experts to remediate environmental damage from legacy mines. Projects have focused on reducing contamination in streams by diverting toxic mine drainage, removing waste rock, minimizing tailings erosion, and vegetating affected areas.



Water Monitoring & Riverside Maintenance

UWP samples water quality at several sites through the statewide River Watch program and with our project partners. We organize annual volunteer work days to pick up litter, weed, and make riparian area improvements along the Uncompandere River in Ridgway and Ouray.

San Juan Mining & Reclamation Conference

UWP is a coordinating partner for the San Juan Mining & Reclamation Conference. This annual event brings together non-profit leaders, researchers, industry professionals and government representatives to discuss current and future mining and water quality issues in our mountain region.
